North Lake & Priest Pond Watershed Management Plan

The Souris & Area Branch (SAB) published its third watershed management plan for North Lake Creek & Priest Pond in March 2012. Similar to previous watershed plans, this plan was entirely community based and sanctioned. The plan outlines goals, strategies and objectives (both short and long term) which provide a guide for the proper management of natural resources.

Former SAB employee Timothy Brothers took the lead on this plan as he used it to complete his master's program in Environmental Management, at the University of New Brunswick. After an initial meeting with the Eastern Kings Community Council (EKCC), permission was granted to begin the planning process and move forward to the community at large. A final public meeting on November 28, 2011 was held to present the draft plan. Fifty five stakeholders attended, and the plan was given approval.

A steering committee was formed, from a diverse group of stakeholders, to ensure the community views were voiced. The "summer residents" in Priest Pond also provided key information and suggestions which are included in this plan. It was rewarding to see both long term and short term residents take such an interest in protecting the environment.

The EKCC boundary encompasses the entire North Lake Watershed and the majority of the Priest Pond watershed. One of most crucial aspects of this plan is to extend the buffer zone from 15 to 60 meters in both watersheds. The EKCC is updating their municipal by-laws this year and this change will be proposed.

If you would like to read this watershed management plan, copies have been made available at the Souris Library. The plan will also be made available on our website in June.

Local Resident Chris Collier Donates a Trail Camera to SAB

A special thank you to SAB member Chris Collier, who donated a Tasco Trail Camera to our organization this spring. Chris has always been a strong supporter of SAB and has donated prizes to our Annual Wildlife Fundraising Dinner over the past number of years.

The uses for this trail camera are practically unlimited. The camera will monitor wildlife areas where poaching or garbage dumping is occurring in an attempt to stop these illegal activities. In the past, we have experienced major problems with such activities and this will aid us in monitoring problematic sites within our management area. As well, it may be used to obtain photos of wildlife in their natural habitat.

The camera utilizes infrared technology to take photos, day or night, silently and without a flash. These photographs can then be downloaded and printed for their appropriate usage.

Tree Swallow Boxes Available to the Public

SAB is pleased to announce that Tree swallow boxes will be available for pickup, free, at the SAB office at the Souris Ski Lodge, as well as at Elliot's General Store.

Tree Swallows are a small, migratory songbird that can be identified by a shiny/ iridescent blue upper body and head with a white underside. They are very agile birds and feed mostly on insects that are caught in flight. They consume a large amount of insects daily, making them ideal around homes for controlling insects.

Tree Swallow boxes should be placed approximately 50 - 100 feet apart and no more than 12 feet off the ground. The boxes should not be placed on trees as squirrels and other animals will eat the eggs. After the Tree Swallows have migrated south, in late autumn, the boxes should be cleaned out to allow for a new nest to be built in the coming year. This can be done by simply removing the side and scooping out the old nest.

The boxes were created through a partnership between SAB and Souris Consolidated School. SAB provided the lumber for the boxes and Graham Townshend's Industrial Arts class constructed the boxes, learning woodworking skills in the process.

Becoming an Outdoors-Woman Workshop to be held in Souris

Becoming an Outdoors-Woman (BOW) is a workshop aimed towards women, and is an opportunity for anyone 18 years of age or older to learn outdoors skills. These skills are usually associated with hunting and fishing, but useful for many outdoor pursuits.

Activities include: canoeing, fly fishing, bait fishing, fish species identification, nature walk with plant identification along the New Harmony trail, outdoor yoga, bonfire and live entertainment.

Watershed Evaluation of Beneficial of Management Practices (WEBs): Latest News

As mentioned in previous newsletters, the Souris & Area Wildlife Branch has partnered with Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, University of Prince Edward Island (UPEI), Nova Scotia Agriculture College (NSAC), Canadian Rivers Institute, PEI Department of Agriculture and Forestry, and PEI Department Of Environment Labor and Justice in an agricultural project in determining nitrate leaching as it relates to spring and fall ploughing. Usually research studies of this type are done within plot situations but this project is done on farms at a watershed scale level.

Kyle Knysh, an entomology Masters student at UPEI, is doing a study on insects within springs adjacent to agricultural settings and those that are located distances from an agricultural setting. He is finding unique specimens, some of which have never being documented on Prince Edward Island. He has agreed to supply us with an article to update some of his findings in a future newsletter.

Souris & Area Branch staff continues to collect water samples from strategic streams, springs, field tile drains, and by the pumping of assigned wells in our producer's fields. This sampling is done on a regular basis.

Soil samples were collected this spring to determine the amount of nutrients available in the soil. All three producer's fields were sampled.

Townshend Potato Company has purchased the property formerly owned by Lily Pond Farms which is a study area for this project. This field will be in a potato rotation in 2012. Rollo Bay Holdings and Arthur Mooney & Sons will be in a grain rotation in 2012.

Souris & Area Wildlife Branch hosted a tour in conjunction with the Canadian Water Network Conference on "The Origin, Occurrence and Fate of Nitrate in Sedimentary Bedrock in Groundwater in the Maritimes". Approximately 20 scientists from various locations in Canada made a site visit to our WEB's fields, which was led by Yefang Jiang, a Hydrogeologist from Agriculture and Agri- Food Canada.

Coordinator's Comments

Attaining funding for staff for stream enhancement work appears to be very difficult this summer; both federal and provincial dollars allocated to this endeavors are at its lowest point in recent years. Programs such as "Community Internship Program", which gave an opportunity for recent university graduates to attain training and mentorship with non-profit organizations has been scrapped. A similar program for these students has been implemented with industry. A program entitled "Post-Secondary Education" from which we traditionally received two university/college students, has unfortunately been downsized and we will only receive one. We have had had a rich history working with Employment Development Agency as they have enabled us to obtain staff and as we enter out first week of our season we have none.

We have made applications to Environment Canada for various projects that include stream enhancement, which was submitted in December 2011. As of yet we have no indication if we have been successful.

These delays make it very difficult to plan work in our watersheds and for us to meet contractual obligations with other agencies. It appears that many of our watersheds will probably not get the attention that they deserve in 2012.

In consultation with other watershed groups across PEI, the issues that I have pointed out appear to be the trend.
